Agenda:

1) Call to Order

Chair Spenrath called the meeting to order at 9:31 AM CDT. A roll call of the planning group members was taken to record attendance and a quorum was established prior to calling the meeting to order.

2) Welcome

Chair Spenrath welcomed members and other attendees to the meeting.

3) Approval of minutes from the previous meeting

The draft meeting minutes of July 18th were reviewed. Ron Fieseler offered proposed corrections to the minutes to incorporate his attendance at the meeting.

Jason Ludwig moved to approve the minutes as amended, seconded by Kirby Brown. The motion passed by a vote of 12-0.

4) Public comments- limit 3 minutes per person

Chair Spenrath called for public comments.

Jed Darland, Tobin Titus, Lisa Bellamy, Lee Earnhaardt, Teri Battersby, and Tanner Shuford provided public comments related to private property rights and the influence of the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals on the regional flood planning process.

Gwyneth Teves provided public comments related to the benefits the regional flood plan will have on the city of Wharton.

5) TWDB Update

Tressa Olsen reported that the TWDB sent a newsletter on September 14th with topics including the draft timeline for the draft flood plan review. TWDB staff are currently reviewing the submitted draft regional flood plans and hope to have comments back to the regions as soon as late October. The TWDB will have some forthcoming information regarding the regional flood plan amendment process and also information regarding base level engineering (BLE). The TWDB will be distributing a stakeholder survey and highly recommend participants give feedback as to how we performed and how we can do better on the next round of planning.

6) Update from RFPG liaisons

Ann Yakimovicz reported that Region 9 held their public meeting last night. The Chair of Region 9 was replaced recently, and things continue to run very smoothly.

Ron Fieseler reported that Region 11 public meeting in Kerrville last week with 30 people in attendance and 6-7 comments were received. Region 11 has another public meeting scheduled in Victoria on Wednesday, September 21st to be held at the University of Houston beginning at 4:30pm. Ron also attended the Region 10 meeting at the LNRA offices last Tuesday.

Kirby Brown reported that Region 12 will hold their public meeting this afternoon. Region 12 has been holding their open houses and public meetings on their draft regional flood plan. Kirby also attended the Region 10 open house at LNRA last week along with Ron Fieseler and one member of the public in attendance.

7) Update from the Planning Group Sponsor

Lauren Graber explained the items on the agenda related to the technical consultant presentations and opportunity for public comment on the draft regional flood plan.

8) Presentation and discussion related to the Draft Region 10 Regional Flood Plan

Mike Personett provided an overview of the draft regional flood plan and process.

9) Accept public input related to the Draft Regional Flood Plan as required per Texas Water Code §16.062(f) and 31 Texas Administrative Code §361.21(h)(3)

Jed Darland and Tobin Titus provided public comments related to public outreach, private property rights, and the influence of the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals on the regional flood planning process.

10) Discussion and potential action to approve mileage expenses for reimbursement

Lauren Graber presented the latest voting member mileage expenses for reimbursement. Jason Ludwig moved to approve the mileage expenses, seconded by Ann Yakimovicz. The motion passed by a vote of 12-0.

11) Discuss and consider action to fill the vacant voting RFPG member seat representing water districts

- a. Public Comments (Public comments limited to 3 minutes per speaker)

 Jed Darland provided public comments related to the qualifications of a water
 district representative and suggested the representative should be familiar with the
 Constitution and the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals.
- b. Consider Executive Committee's recommendation, discussion and consider taking action to fill the water district interest category position for a term commensurate with the initial voting members

Lauren Graber stated that the Executive Committee met on August 24th to review and consider two nominees for the vacant water district position on the group. After discussion, the committee determined that neither nominee met the qualifications for the water district position and voted to recommend to the full planning group that we reopen the window for nominations and look for additional candidates with an increased focus on outreach to water districts and related groups.

After discussion, Kelly Payne made a motion that we accept the recommendation of the Executive Committee to reopen the window for nominations for the vacant water district representative with an emphasis on additional outreach to water districts or affiliated associations within Region 10. Hank Smith seconded the motion. The motion passed by a vote of 12-0.

12) Update from the Technical Committee

Kelly Payne reported that since the last RFPG meeting, the Technical Committee met and, along with our technical consultants, discussed potential list of FMEs (studies) that our consultants will further to FMP (project) status as part of Task 12. After discussion, the Technical Committee agreed with the list proposed by the technical consultants and will recommend approval by the RFPG later in the agenda. This list includes seven studies and a budget of \$500,000. This budget is currently larger than our Task 12 budget, but due to efficiencies in performing some of the work to date, the consultant team feels there will be money we can reallocate to Task 12 to complete the work presently anticipated.

Of note during the discussions, one of the FMEs recommended for future study, Creek Street at Barons Creek, is currently in our draft Regional Flood Plan as an FMP (project). In discussions with the City of Fredericksburg on our proposed list of FMEs for further advancement, the city indicated that one of their priorities was to develop a structural solution to flooding at the Creek Street/Barons Creek intersection. Our current draft Regional Flood Plan has an FMP at this location with a flood warning solution. The city wishes to revise the draft Regional Flood Plan to indicate this as an FME looking for a structural solution. Therefore, after discussions with the Technical Committee and confirmation from the TWDB that we can make that change and include the new FME for Creek Street at Barons Creek in our list of projects to develop further with Task 12 scope, the Technical Committee included this FME in the list of projects recommended to the RFPG for approval.

13) Technical Consultant presentations and discussions related to regional flood planning

Mike Personett (Halff Associates, Inc.), and Karen Ford (Water PR) provided updates, briefings, and discussion on the project status and look-ahead.

Planning group members asked questions and made comments during the presentation. The following items include highlights of the discussion during this agenda item.

Beth Bendik asked questions regarding the potential outcome and stream impacts of the FM 812 at Little Alum Creek and the Piney Creek Benching studies listed under Task 12.

Cindy Englehardt discussed the studies Beth asked about in greater detail.

The planning group members and consultants discussed the rationale for the recommended FMEs to be furthered to FMPs. They also discussed the availability of current and future funding to complete studies and projects.

14) Discussion and potential action on recommendations regarding Task 12 – Perform Identified Flood Management Evaluations, Identify, Evaluate, and Recommend Additional Flood Mitigation Projects

The planning group members and consultants discussed the proposed FMEs to be furthered to FMPs, as recommended by the Technical Committee.

Kelly Payne moved to accept the recommendation of the Technical Committee for the list of FMEs to be furthered to FMPs under Task 12 of the scope of work with the technical consultants, subject to the availability of funds to complete the work, seconded by Brandon Klenzendorf. A roll call vote was taken, and the motion passed by a vote of 12-0.

15) Public comments - limit 3 minutes per person

Chair Spenrath called for public comments.

Jed Darland, Bonita Baczewski, and Lisa Bellamy provided comments related to constitutional rights, outreach and the influence of the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals on the regional flood planning process.

16) Consider date and agenda items for next meeting

After general discussion, Chair Phillip Spenrath concluded that the next meeting will be held on Monday, November 7th, 2022 at 9:30 AM CST.

Lauren Graber stated that future meeting dates may change depending on when we receive comments from the TWDB.

17) Adjourn

Kelly Payne made a motion to adjourn, seconded by Patrick Brzozowski. The motion passed 12-0 and the meeting was adjourned at 11:43 AM CDT by Chair Phillip Spenrath.



Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) staff has performed a review of the draft regional flood plan submitted by August 1, 2022 on behalf of the Region 10 Lower Colorado-Lavaca Regional Flood Planning Group (RFPG). The attached comments will follow this format:

- LEVEL 1: Comments and questions that must be satisfactorily addressed to meet specific statute, rule, or contract requirements; and,
- LEVEL 2: Comments and suggestions for consideration that may improve the readability and/or overall
 understanding of the regional flood plan

Please note that while Level 2 comments are provided for the planning group's consideration, Level 1 comments must be addressed prior to the submission of final Regional Flood Plans by the January 10, 2023 deadline.

It is expected that the data contained in all written report sections, tables, excel spreadsheets, and the geodatabase will be consistent throughout. In cases where there are any discrepancies in data, the geodatabase dataset will supersede other data and the TWDB will utilize the geodatabase dataset when developing the state flood plan.

TWDB review of the draft regional flood plans is comprised of many spot checks of data across several deliverables and is not an all-encompassing data review. Please note that TWDB's review does not imply accuracy of the draft regional flood plan. Each RFPG is responsible for ensuring the completeness and accuracy of the plan and all associated data

To facilitate efficient and timely completion, and Board approval, of your final regional flood plan, please provide your TWDB Regional Flood Planner with a draft of your response to these comments (e.g., informally via email) on the draft RFP as soon as possible. This will allow TWDB staff to provide preliminary feedback on proposed RFPG responses to assist you in meeting your RFPG's timeline for approval and submission to TWDB of the final plan by the deadline. This will also help to minimize the need for subsequent follow-up following final regional flood plan submission to TWDB.

Community Comments

West Brazoria County Drainage District No. 11 – request addition of 1 FME

- District-wide Drainage Master Plan \$1 million
 - Comprehensive assessment of drainage infrastructure and existing drainage conditions to identify mitigation activities

City of Fredericksburg – redefine FMP

- Creek Street at Barons Creek Redefine from a flood early warning project to a structural project.
 - RFPG approved evaluation of this structural project for Task 12

Johnson City – supports recommendations

Support recommendations pertaining to Blanco County and Johnson City

Community Comments

Wharton County – request addition of 14 FMEs and 3 FMPs

- Lower Peach Creek Channel Widening and Regional Detention Project FMP

- Pecan Valley Phase 2 Project Phase 2 FME

Individual Comments

- Align watershed protection plans with state and regional flood plan to ensure flood risk reduction and water quality improvements are considered together
- Oppose infringement on private property rights, want guarantees that property rights will not be infringed upon
- Oppose groundwater regulation including metering wells
- Request that text from Chapter 18 of the 1992 United Nations Agenda 21, specifically 18.11 (b) and 18.12 (a) through (p), be included in the Regional Flood Plan sees Agenda 21 as the precursor to SB8 establishing the state and regional flood planning process
- Oppose United Nations 2030 Sustainable Development Goals as a rebrand of United Nations Agenda 21
- Concern that Region 10 RFPG failed to provide adequate notice to the public, to ensure public input as the minutes of meetings document almost no public comment
- Glen Flora flooding concern (also supported by Wharton County comment)
- Llano County FME #72 Prepare Evacuation Plan County should retain/maintain existing systems for flood warning such as sirens and marquee

Group/Organization Comments

US Army Corps of Engineers (USACE)

- Legislative
 - Establish non-regulatory regional flood control or drainage districts in rapidly growing urban areas
 - Clarify statutory authority of counties to regulate floodplains
- Regulatory
 - Require use of channel conditions that would result if a channel for project is not maintained
 - Only allow maintenance by organizations with the necessary capabilities and capacity
 - Prevent loss of valley storage at the 500-year flood level. Allow redistribution of valley storage
 - Establish future land use plans for unincorporated areas in proximity to rapidly urbanizing areas
 - Use projected fully developed conditions for floodplain regulation and development of mitigation projects
- State Planning
 - Encourage storm shifting/centering to validate 100-yr flood and possibility of actual flood risk
 - Watershed Hydrology Assessments: add detail to leverage studies and update as new precipitation is avaliable
 - For large urban centers establish regional approach to development of future condition flood risk

Group/Organization Comments

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD)

- Support Regional Flood Planning process and TWDB's "integrative" approach to flood risk management.
- Prioritize non-structural flood risk management strategies before structural (e.g., policy, land management, emergency management)
- Encourage use of nature-based approaches where possible
- Include ecological and societal benefits of flooding in education programs
- Encourage consideration of TCEQ environmental flow standards for the Colorado and Lavaca Rivers and for Matagorda and Lavaca Bays
- Include in Chapter 1, a map depicting ecoregions as delineated by either EPA for TPWD
- Recognize that flooding is a natural process that has beneficial effects
- Concerns about adverse environmental/ecological impacts of stream channelization, structural measure at low water crossings, and on-channel impoundments
- Supports policy recommendations for stream crossing design to avoid/minimize impacts, tax incentives for stream and riparian protection, incentives for green infrastructure and nature-based flood risk reduction strategies

Group/Organization Comments

Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT)

- TxDOT does not use transportation projects for flood relief
- Can partner/cost-share with local entities to address flooding issues at roadway crossings that are
 planned for improvements suggest looking for such opportunities at a statewide level
- Research project underway to assess roadway flooding statewide results could point to locations where coordination and collaboration would be beneficial
- Technical:
 - Methodology used to assess risk at inundated roadways is very conservative
 - TxDOT roadway centerline is not always on pavement and sometimes is in the center of a divided highway or corridor and may not capture elevated roadways

Group/Organization Comments

National Wildlife Federation (NWF)

- Concern about evaluation of natural flood mitigation features for level of function and use in flood risk mitigation (e.g., lack of Texas-specific data)
- Prioritize funding for preventative flood mitigation strategies, for protection natural infrastructure, and for implementation of nature-based solutions
- Ensure cost-benefit analyses give appropriate weight to social and economic benefit and avoidance of adverse environmental impact
- Recognize the role that land development codes and location of infrastructure have on flood impacts
- Provide training and technical resources to advance understanding and adoption of nature-based solutions and best practices for maintaining floodplains and other natural flood mitigation features

Group/Organization Comments

Hill Country Alliance and Greater Edwards Aquifer Alliance

- Strongly recommend implementation of nature-based flood risk reduction strategies
- Comments and recommendations mirror many of those provided by the NWF and the Greater Edwards Aquifer Alliance:
 - Emphasis on prevention and protection/restoration of natural features that provide flood risk reduction and other social and environmental benefits
 - Increase training and funding available to implement nature-based solutions
 - Promote regional approach to floodplain management using nature-based solutions
 - Provide counties with greater authority over land use as it affects natural features that provide flood risk reduction features and provide counties with authority to levy drainage utility fees
 - Provide counties and groundwater districts with authority to protect natural aquifer recharge features
 - Review recommended FMXs to determine feasibility to include or increase nature-based elements

Group/Organization Comments

Great Springs Project – request addition of 1 FME

- Evaluate the Great Springs Project \$250,000 study cost
 - Determine the flood risks involved in the affected area
 - Assess and quantify the flood mitigation impacts of GSP land conservation and trail development as well as how GSP may contribute to adjacent flood mitigation efforts
 - Identify possible and appropriate modifications to open space and trail features that would enhance the flood mitigation of GSP and adjacent flood mitigation efforts
 - Quantify the added benefits of combining GSP efforts with Region 10 flood mitigation projects
 - Develop appropriate proposals for FMSs and FMPs for inclusion in the Region 10 Regional Flood Plan
 - Submit a final report within one year of FME funding
